



Braille Literacy Month

National Braille Literacy Month raises awareness of the importance of Braille to the blind and visually impaired community.

Though its use has decreased in the past few decades due to innovations in audio technology, Braille is still used today in the workplace and classroom.

Take a moment this month to learn about Braille's history—including NCR (and Dayton's) contributions.

In 1948, the National Cash Register company learned about D.W. Lawrence, a Westville, Ohio food market proprietor who was blind.

To record sales and total purchases, Lawrence used a Class 6000 cash register by memorizing the position of the keys —no easy feat.

The NCR salesman, P.J. McGugin, who

sold Lawrence his cash register, wrote to the company's Dayton based product development department for help.


Their solution? NCR constructed a ninekey register, drilling holes and inserting brass studs to create the raised patterns of Braille letters and numbers.

Though the company acknowledged that the concept of a Braille register was not new, NCR's model for Lawrence was the first time it had been applied to a more complex machine.

NCR was founded by John H. Patterson in 1884. The Patterson family lot is located in section 13, lot 2871 at Woodland Cemetery.

Roscoe Iddings Born 01/28/1889

Roscoe C. Iddings was born in Dayton in 1889. The younger brother of Andrew Iddings, Roscoe sometimes had the opportunity to join his older



brother on trips around the world; from the Arctic Circle to the African Savannah.

By tradition, the Idding's family business was law -Roscoe's older brothers, his father, and his grandfather were all practicing attorneys. However, a 1909 visit to New York taught Roscoe about the firefighting business inspiring him to instead build his own reputation as a shrewd businessman. In 1916, he founded the Fyr-Fyter Company, which manufactured fire extinguishers in Dayton until the company was sold in 1947.

In 1971, at the age of 82, Roscoe Iddings died. He is buried in the Iddings family lot; section 37, lot 1148 at Woodland Cemetery.

Sanford Thurman Sr.

(7/14/1903 - 7/24/2007)

Sanford Thurman Sr. was born in Palmetto, Georgia, though he lived in Dayton for most of his life. In 1926, he married Ethel Wilson.

Decades later, Ethel read an article about adopting children who had been orphaned by the Korean War. The Thurmans welcomed 6 year old Sanford Thurman Jr. in 1959; his younger brother Michael in 1960, and their older sister Kim three years later.

Working hard to support his family, Sanford Thurman Sr. started work at NCR as a janitor—he would retire 21 years later as an electrician. The only

day of work he ever missed was in 1963, travelling to South Korea to bring Kim home to Ohio.

Sanford Thurman Sr. died July 24 th, 2007 at the age of 104. He is laid to rest in section 307, lot Q at Woodland Cemetery.






