

In Memory of Paul Laurence Dunbar



An internationally renowned poet, novelist, and short story writer, Paul Laurence Dunbar was born in Dayton, Ohio, to Joshua Dunbar & Matilda Burton Murphy. Before the Civil War, both had been enslaved in Kentucky.

Growing up with few opportunities for formal education, as an adult Matilda Dunbar enrolled in night classes at the school on Zieger Street. She taught Paul, her youngest son, the basics of reading and impressed upon him the importance of education.

Paul Laurence Dunbar began writing stories and verse when he was a child, publishing his first poems in a Dayton newspaper at the age of just 16. He became the president of the Literary Society at Dayton Central High School and was the editor of the school paper. In 1890, after graduation, Paul Laurence Dunbar collaborated with Orville Wright; a former classmate, to publish the Dayton Tattler, a


Black neighborhood newspaper.

A positive review by William Dean Howells, editor at *Harper's Weekly*, increased Dunbar's popularity practically overnight.

One of the first Black American poets to establish an international reputation; Paul Laurence Dunbar traveled to England in 1897 for a literary tour, giving readings on the London circuit.

During his lifetime, much of Dunbar's most popular poetry was written in a "Negro dialect" style associated with the antebellum South, though he also wrote poems using a "Midwestern regional dialect" popularized by James Whitcomb Riley.

Over his tragically short lifetime, Paul Laurence Dunbar produced an impressive body of work including novels & short stories, essays, plays, newspaper articles, and over 600 poems.



Simon Snyder Mumma Born 2/2/1856

Interested in plants & flowers all his life, Simon Snyder Mumma was born February 2nd, 1856. As the second son born into Jacob J.W. & Susannah Mumma's large family, Simon grew up with nine brothers and one sister.

As an adult, Simon Mumma was well known at downtown Dayton's 3rd Street Market, where he sold seasonal vegetables and his specialty, strawberries, for 25 years. He also operated a gardening business from a farm located at Fairview Ave. & Philadelphia Dr., which later became home to Good Samaritan Hospital.

In 1882, Simon Mumma married Nancy Mae Studebaker. Together they raised three daughters; Myrtle, Ethel, and Orpha and a son; Earl.



Simon Snyder Mumma died November 15 th, 1947 at the age of 91. He is buried in section 120, lot 159 at Woodland Cemetery.

Neva Hiatt (8/7/1902 - 4/10/2006)

Neva Hiatt was born August 7th, 1902 in Kentucky to Isaac & Nettie Crouch. Neva married James Hiatt, a Dayton jeweler who worked in the 3rd Street Arcade for many years.

Together they had two daughters; Jean (Paskin) & Mary (Zimmerman).

On the family lot in

Woodland's section 126, lot 154, both Mary and Jean's markers are decorated with elegant carvings of ballet shoes; a fitting tribute to two women who owned and operated dance studios.


Upon her retirement from the Mary Hiatt School of Dance, Neva Hiatt lived for many years at the Ohio Masonic Home. In the photo above, she is seated on the left; visiting with her daughter Mary and son-in-law George in 1997.

Neva Hiatt died April 10 th, 2006, at the age of 103. She and her family rest peacefully at Woodland Cemetery.



Not into public speaking? Consider getting involved with our horticulture team, or assisting with special events & research projects.




