

Welcome back, migratory birds!

During spring migration, most birds pass through the contiguous U.S. beginning in mid-April and continuing through mid-May. During peak migration periods, more than a billion birds may be in the air on a single night.

From that vantage point, Woodland Cemetery looks like a green oasis in the middle of urban Dayton—making it ideal for birding. This week, let's say hello to some fine feathered friends who will be making their way north soon!

Chimney Swift – Chaetura pelagica

Often compared to a cigar on wings, the chimney swift builds a bracket-style nest onto a vertical surface; for preference, a human-built structure—especially a



nice, cozy chimney. Before humans thoughtfully began providing these, chimney swifts made do with hollow trees or old woodpecker nests.

As far as avian housemates go, these sooty grey birds can be nice to have around—researchers estimate that a pair of swifts feeding 3 chicks eat more than 5000 fly-sized insects per day!

American Goldfinch – Spinus tristis

This small, active bird is a regular visitor to backyard feeders throughout its range; or between the office & mausoleum at Woodland.

Like the familiar northern cardinal, male goldfinches are easily recognizable by their vibrant yellow plumage, while females are a less flashy yellow-brown.

You can encourage goldfinches to visit your yard by planting tasty zinnias, cosmos, and bee balm, which produce their favorite seedheads.

Did You Know:

A goldfinch's nest is so tightly woven that it can hold water!

Ruby-Throated Hummingbird – Archilochus colubris



Not content with having one of the highest metabolic rates of any animal, the tiny but mighty ruby-throated hummingbird manages an annual 500 mile non-stop flight from the Yucatan peninsula to Florida and Louisiana.

Herons:


A familiar sight along Dayton's riverbanks, the Great Blue Heron is the largest heron in North America. They can be spotted at Woodland's Goose Lake; standing silently along the shore. The calm stillness of a heron while hunting is a marked contrast to their lightning-fast strike; these birds are often symbolically linked to vigilance & flexibility, and are often used to represent grace & beauty.

In the Iliad, the goddess Athena sends a heron to declare her support for the hero Odysseus; lending the bird her virtues of strategy, femininity, cleverness and victory.




Join us for the Tiffany Chapel Concert Series




