



Spring in the Cemetery

Home to more than 3,000 trees, Woodland Cemetery is full of beautiful plant life. If you're itching to see signs of spring, come take a stroll and stop to smell the flowers!

Springbeauty: Claytonia virginica

A favorite springtime showstopper, the tulip or saucer magnolia is a multi-stemmed large shrub or small tree.

The specimens located just inside Woodland's main entrance may stretch the definition of 'small'; one is even a former state champion tree!

This species was initially bred by Étienne Soulange-Bodin, a retired cavalry officer in Napoleon's army, near Paris.

In 1820, he crossed *Magnolia denudata* with *M. liliiflora*, and was impressed with the resulting precocious flowering in 1826.

This adorable little plant can be found in many parts of eastern North America. In some places, it is considered a weed—but then, the only difference between a plant and a weed is the viewer's perspective.

Spring beauty corms (bulbs) along with the entire above ground portion of the plant are safe to eat—one of its common names is, after all, the 'fairy spud'. The Iroquois and Algonquin people are said to have cooked and eaten the roots like potatoes, though Dykeman & Elias' Edible wild plants: a North American field guide to over 200 natural foods suggests that they are not especially tasty. Bees disagree—pollination ecologists note that the Springbeauty feeds a large number of native bees.

That Sinking Feeling...

According to Hollywood, the way burial works is: gravediggers dig a hole, fill it in again, and that's the end of that. Unfortunately, Mother Nature and Fun Uncle Physics don't allow things to be quite as simple in the real world.

When a grave is dug, the soil is loosened. When the grave is filled in, it will inevitably contain more

pockets of air than the same soil before burial occurred. As the air escapes and the soil compacts, the grave may appear to sink. This is completely natural and practically unavoidable, especially in wet weather.

Here at Woodland, it usually takes at least a year for a grave to finish settling—sometimes even longer. Exactly how long can vary quite a bit for all kinds of reasons, such as soil type and weather patterns over many months. For this reason, there is no clear-cut, hard and fast rule about when a gravesite will look the way it did before burial occurred.

Sometimes, visitors experience a sense of discomfort to find that their loved one's burial plot appears to be sinking. If you notice a sunk grave, we advise that you notify our main office. We can identify the location using the name on the memorial and schedule the required maintenance work.



<u>Daffodils</u>: Narcissus poeticus

Daffodils have a rich symbolic history—they are the flower of both the Underworld and of Paradise. Growing wild in Southern Europe, the Mediterranean & North Africa, daffodils are a familiar sight in gardens around the world.

According to Greek myth, Hades (god of the Underworld) used daffodils to abduct the goddess Persephone. While she was busy picking flowers, she did not see Hades lying in wait to kidnap her. Daffodils also play a part in the

myth of Narcissus, which is why they are sometimes symbolically linked to mourning or misfortune. In Christian symbolism, the daffodil is linked with Easter—rebirth, regeneration, and new beginnings.

Woodland is seeking volunteers to give presentations to community groups on subjects such as local history, notable biographies, and trees.




