




# National Inventor's Month:

National Inventors Month recognizes the curiosity and imagination of the people who innovate and create.

In the years following the Civil War, Dayton grew from a place where things were made into a place where things were invented. By the early 1900s, Dayton had more patents per capita than any other U.S. city.

Today, some of these inventors rest in Woodland Cemetery—here are just a few of them!


<u>Levitt Luzern Custer</u> (7/27/1888 - 8/30/1962)



Levitt Luzern Custer graduated from Otterbein University in 1909 and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1913.

In 1919, he invented an early form of motorized wheelchair called the Custer Chair.

Edith Boyer (7/27/1888 - 8/30/1962)



Edith & her husband Israel were both mechanically minded.

Mr. Boyer died suddenly in 1899, as they were working on a tag making machine. Mrs. Boyer completed the machine, which took paper or cardboard tags and inserted a knotted

string loop into a hole in the tag.

From 1910 until 1915, the Boyers' small factory produced about 20 million tags for many different companies.

# <u>Philip Haas</u> (6/7/1874 - 9/30/1927)

Born in Germany, Philip Haas is sometimes known as the 'Father of the Modern Toilet'. Over the course of his career, he received 31 patents connected to plumbing innovation.

By inventing the flush rim toilet and developing a hydraulic flush valve—both features we'd recognize in our bathrooms at home, Philip Haas transformed the notoriously unreliable water closet into the modern commode.



# Symbols of the Season:

# Poppy:

Poppies have long been used as a symbol of sleep, peace, and death. During WWI, following trench warfare in Flanders, Belgium, the redflowered corn poppy (or: *Papaver rhoeas*) became associated with the remembrance of soldiers who died in combat. This type of poppy is commonly found on many former battlefields, including at Flanders, which is the setting of John McCrae's famous poem "In Flanders Fields".

The association between poppies and sleep has a similarly long-standing history. On grave markers, the poppy traditionally represents the idea of 'eternal rest'; probably because opium (a sedative) is derived from a type of poppy. In Greek and Roman traditions, poppies were often chosen as offerings to the dead.




