### Professional Baseball Players at Woodland Cemetery:

Dan Bickham arrived at Princeton University without much baseball experience, until an impressive save as relief pitcher during the annual Freshmen vs. Seniors game revealed a hidden talent. His Sophomore year, Dan made the varsity team as an outfielder.

Returning for his Junior year, Bickham made his varsity pitching debut in an exhibition match against the major league Philadelphia Athletics. It was a disaster—the Princeton Tigers lost, 21-2. Dan Bickham, who had "no control of the ball" was probably relieved when the game was called in the 5<sup>th</sup> inning.

The rest of Bickham's college baseball career was less eventful, if a little inconsistent. Though his skills as a pitcher drew interest from the major leagues, Bickham followed his father's and coach's advice and declined to go pro.

Until August 13<sup>th</sup>, 1886, when the Cincinnati Red Stockings offered Dan Bickham the chance to face the Philadelphia Athletics one more time.

With more than a thousand people in the stands, Cincinnati broke an 8<sup>th</sup> inning tie to defeat the Philadelphia Athletics 12-11.

Dan Bickham retired with a perfect record and returned to Dayton to work at his father's newspaper, the Dayton Journal. Dan died in 1951, at the age of 86. He is buried in the Bickham family lot (section 101, lot 1420) at Woodland Cemetery.




Cincinnati Red Stockings Pitcher - 1886
