




## Did You Know: Dunbar Edition



Paul Laurence Dunbar's current gravesite is not where he was originally buried!

The poet died February 9<sup>th</sup>, 1906—and although his funeral was held three days later, his body was held in Woodland's Receiving Vault for several weeks. This decision might have been a purely practical one; allowing time for the ground to thaw would make burial much easier.

Or maybe not:

According to a <u>letter</u> from John H. Finley to Dunbar's estranged wife, Alice Moore Dunbar, Paul's time in the Receiving Vault was at the

poet's own request.

In April of 1906, Paul Laurence Dunbar was buried near the Wyoming Street gate in section 111. Shortly afterward, a memorial committee was formed to raise funds for a new grave & memorial in a 'more suitable' location:

"At a meeting of the Paul Laurence Dunbar Memorial Association, held this day, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted: purchase Lot 3465, in Section 101, in the Woodland Cemetery, to provide for the burial of the remains of the distinguished poet, Paul Laurence Dunbar, and for the erection of a suitable monument to his memory; also for the perpetual care of the same, and memorial exercises at the dedication of the monument.

No burials shall be permitted in said lot, except for the remains of Paul Laurence Dunbar and his devoted mother, Mrs. Matilda J. Dunbar."

Finally, on June 27<sup>th</sup>, 1909, Paul Laurence Dunbar was moved to his current resting place in section 101. His memorial was unveiled: a granite boulder bearing a bronze plate designed by Tiffany & Co., with a verse of Dunbar's own poem, 'A Death Song' as an epitaph.

The deed to the lot was transferred to Paul's beloved mother, Matilda J. Dunbar, who was buried beside her son in 1934.

A cenotaph\*\*\* for Elizebeth Florence Dunbar, Paul's younger sister, was placed in 2006.

\*\*\*A cenotaph refers to a memorial for a person who is buried elsewhere. In this case, Elizebeth Dunbar is buried in Woodland Cemetery's City Lot.

This window is a reference to the second stanza of Dunbar's 'A Death Song':

Lay me nigh to whah hit meks a little pool.

An' de watah stan's so quiet lak an' cool,

Whah de little birds in spring,

Ust to come an' drink an' sing,
An' de chillen waded on dey way to
school.

One reason that Paul Laurence Dunbar's poems are so special is the poet's use of dialect. While this style is able to capture the way that people spoke at the turn of the century, modern readers may find it more difficult to read than Dunbar's more traditional poetry.

We recommend <u>listening to this</u> <u>poem</u> as read by Dunbar scholar Herbert Woodward Martin—hearing the verses aloud brings their richness and beauty to life, even when the poem is about death.





Not into public speaking? Consider getting involved with our horticulture team, or assisting with special events & research projects.




