




A Green Mansion


The scene depicted in this window comes from W.H. Hudson's 1904 novel, Green Mansions: A Romance of the Tropical Forest.

Set in southern Venezuela, <u>Green Mansions</u> tells the story of Abel, a failed revolutionary, who flees the capitol city for the

uncharted forest.

In the mountains there, he meets a girl named Rima, the last of her people, who speaks to birds in an unknown language.





William Henry Hudson
1841 - 1922

In his birthplace (Argentina) William Henry Hudson is better known as Guillermo Enrique Hudson.

His memoir, <u>Far Away and Long</u>
<u>Ago</u>, is traditionally used to teach
English in Japan.

When he wasn't writing novels, William Henry Hudson was known as a respected naturalist and ornithologist who regularly contributed specimens to the Smithsonian collection.

In his memoir, Hudson vividly describes the first time he saw a flamingo, sparking a life-long love for birdwatching.

Many of Woodland's visitors come to the cemetery for the same reason—part of a tradition that goes back to the origins of Woodland Cemetery itself.

In a time before public parks or botanical gardens, cemeteries like Woodland offered their communities an opportunity to see examples of fine sculpture, horticulture, and local wildlife.

Historic Oddfellows Lot:



Did You Know:

Also known as "The Three Link Fraternity", the Independent Order of Oddfellows began in England during the 1700's, partly to care for widows and orphans.

Originally owned by the Independent Order of Oddfellows (I.O.O.F), this lot was given back to the cemetery in 2018. A monument was placed shortly afterward to honor these members of one of the United States' earliest fraternal orders.

One great place to spot birds at Woodland is at the historic Oddfellows lot. Surrounded by towering trees, visitors often see Red-Tailed hawks, a variety of woodpeckers, and even the occasional owl. Located just off the cemetery's main drive, this picturesque section has a unique history all its own.

A perfect final resting place for lovers of nature & history alike, spaces in the Oddfellows lot are still available for traditional or cremation burials.


Cremation lots are able to accommodate multiple urns; their memorials will be engraved on each section of granite-capped retaining wall, which offers visitors a beautiful view of exactly what makes Woodland a landmark cemetery.





Not into public speaking? Consider getting involved with our horticulture team, or assisting with special events & research projects.




