The Holiday Spirit



The first Christmas tree in Dayton was at the home of [Horace Pease](#).

Candlelit Christmas trees as we know them today have their roots in Germany. The tradition made its way to the United States via Pennsylvania's German community in the 1820's, but didn't spread as rapidly as we might imagine.

As late as the 1840's, Americans didn't want much to do with Christmas trees—until the internationally fashionable Queen Victoria changed their minds.

In 1846, the *Illustrated London News* published a sketch of the Queen & her German-born husband, Prince Albert, standing with their children around a Christmas tree. This image was widely circulated by Godey's Lady's Book in the United States, boosting the popularity of the Christmas tree considerably.

## Happy Birthday!

Lorenzo L. Langstroth

In the 1850s, Congregationalist minister Lorenzo L. Langstroth knew more about honeybees than anyone in America. His discovery of bee-space and invention of the movable frame hive would revolutionize the beekeeping industry, and earn him the title, "Father of American Beekeeping."

Born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on Christmas day in 1810, Rev. Langstroth came to Dayton in 1893 to live with his sister. He died in 1895 while giving a sermon at the Wayne Avenue Presbyterian Church in Dayton, Ohio, and is laid to rest in section 103, lot 2634 at Woodland Cemetery.

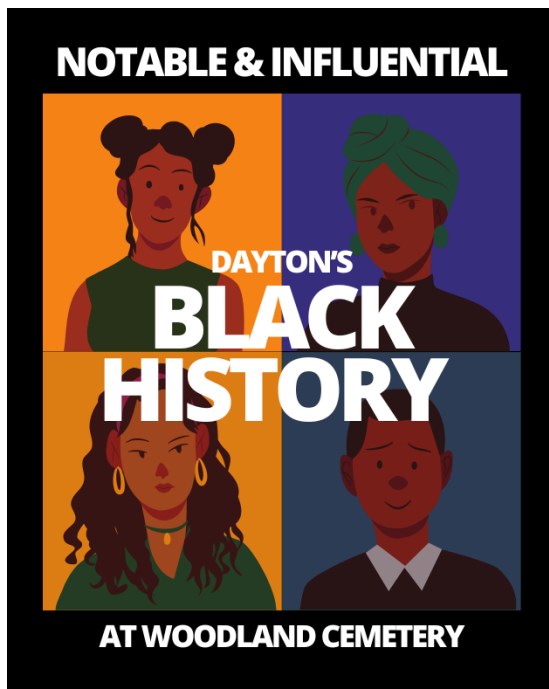
